Dear Friends.

Throughout history, when explorers have gone out to find lost civilizations or to reach heights that no human has ever reached, they never go alone, but always take a guide with them. A guide may not have been down that exact route before, but a guide is familiar with the terrain and can help when issues, uncertainties, and problems arise. In many instances, a guide on an expedition can mean the difference between success or failure, life or death.

The spiritual life is an expedition of the soul. It's not the same as a physical expedition, but in many ways it is quite similar. An expedition of the soul takes us to new places, often where we have not been before. And this is where spiritual direction comes in.

As a pastor, my primary role is to be the spiritual guide of the community. My role is to try to keep God before the eyes of the community. But a community is also made up of individuals, and individuals are often on their own journeys in addition to the journey the community is on. And for this, individual spiritual direction can be helpful.

So what is spiritual direction? Spiritual direction is sharing the spiritual journey with a trained guide. Often a directee and director meet once a month, where the directee can speak about their experience of the spiritual life, and the director deeply listens to them, and to the Spirit, and seeks to help the directee to navigate their expedition. Just like Tenzing Norgay didn't make climbing Mount Everest easy for Edmund Hillary (it was still Mount Everest after all!), Hillary would never have made it without Norgay guiding and accompanying him to places where no human has ever gone.

Spiritual direction is not counseling, though it can be helpful in combination. Whereas counseling often deals with emotional, psychological, or relational issues (but also brushes up against the spiritual life), spiritual direction deals directly with the spiritual life but also brushes up against these other things. Spiritual direction is not a judgmental zone where the director tries to make sure you have "right answers." Rather, spiritual direction is a place for you to reflect on your path, and the director can help guide. Spiritual direction has been an important part of my life; I had a spiritual director throughout my pastorate, both in Wisconsin and here.

There are many things that might draw someone to spiritual direction. Perhaps there has been a change in one's life—a loss, a gain, a transition, &c—and one is seeking to find God in the midst of all that. Perhaps one feels as though God is distant, or perhaps God feels newly close. Perhaps one feels a desire for a companion who can help them make sense of the journey. Or maybe one just wants to grow in the spiritual life.

Or, perhaps something has shaken the foundations of your faith or spirituality. Perhaps you find yourself taking that part of your life apart, piece by piece, and examining it anew. Perhaps you want to deconstruct something and reconstruct something new and beautiful and life-giving.

As part of my ministry, I'm going to be beginning a training program in spiritual direction at the Spiritual Renewal Center in Syracuse. An integral part of this program is the supervised practice of spiritual direction. Might this be something that you are interested in? Let's explore it together! It's my hope that this will further enhance my ability to minister to and with you as we all seek to grow deeper into life before God.

Benevolence: Plans are being made for a "meal for peace" on October 22, replacing the regular coffee hour. The purpose of this is to raise awareness. There is no fund raiser or a request for funding attached to this plan.

Congregational Life Committee: October 2 will be the first community dinner, and all volunteer slots have been filled. Forty people attended the church picnic at Bozenkill Park and twenty people are signed up to attend the Women's Retreat on September 23.

Faith Formation: Carole deForest has been in discussion with several people in the congregation and a committee has been formed by Carole, Dan Capuano, Laurie Warner, Jan Chisholm, and Ellen Howie. Janelle and Felipe Silva report that Ethan, a volunteer with the RCA Cultivate program, spent the summer as an intern at their climbing gym in Vulcan, Romania. They are grateful for his energy, openness, humor, and route-setting skills and wish him well as he returns to school.
